2. Julius Caesar had two unsuccessful attempts to invade and conquer Britain in 54 and 55BC.
3. Emperor Claudius, the leader of the Roman Empire, planned a successful invasion in 43AD.
4. Claudius wanted resources from Britain. He thought a successful invasion would make him popular.
5. We know about Roman Britain by visiting archaeological sites and looking at remains.
6. In many parts of Britain, there are Roman sites, including roads, villas and forts.
7. Hadrian's Wall is the most famous Roman site.
8. We can also read written accounts about Roman Britain, for example the Vindolanda Tablets.
9. In Roman times, most people lived in the country. Their lives didn't change very much.
10. Roman people brought many positive things to Britain. Their impact can still be seen today.
11. The Roman period did not end abruptly in 410AD. Some Roman people continued to live in Britain.
