RE Term 2 Knowledge Organiser - How do festivals and family life show what matters to Jews?







Key questions we will explore:

- What do Jewish people believe about God, sin and forgiveness?
- How and why do Jewish people celebrate Rosh Hashana, Yom Kipper and Passover?
- Why are these festivals important to Jewish people?
- What is the significance of the Exodus story?
- Why is forgiveness an important aspect of Judaism?
- Why are the Ten Commandments important to Jews?

Key Knowledge:

- Like Christianity, Judaism teaches that there is only one God and that God created the world. God expressed what he expects of people in the Ten Commandments and other laws.
- Judaism teaches that because humans have been given free will, they are responsible for their own actions. If they do something which is wrong, then they must seek forgiveness.
- The story of **Exodus** means 'going out' in Latin. It is about how the Hebrew people were led out of Egypt by God. Moses, their leader, hears God's words and then tells the Israelites.
- Passover is a celebration of the story of Exodus.
- During Passover, Jews remember how their ancestors left slavery behind them when they were led out of Egypt by Moses. Passover is celebrated with a series of rituals. Each ritual symbolises a different part of the story.
- On the evening before Passover starts, Jews have a special service called a **Seder** (Order). This takes place over a meal with family and friends at home.
- Rosh Hashana is a time for people to reflect on the past year and to ask for forgiveness for anything wrong they feel they have done.
- All synagogues have a large cupboard facing Jerusalem called the Aron hakodesh, which symbolises
 the Ark of the Covenant that held the tablets of stone with the Ten Commandments received by
 Moses. It is the centrepiece of the synagogue and holds the Torah scrolls. It is thought of as the
 holiest part of the synagogue.

Shabbat	The day that God rested from creating the world.
Sabbath	A day of religious observance and abstinence from work.
Passover	A Jewish holiday that celebrates the Biblical story of the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt.
Rosh Hashana	The Jewish New Year festival.
Atonement	The action of making amends for a wrongdoing.
Torah	The law of God as revealed to Moses and recorded in the first five books of the Hebrew scriptures.
Siddur	Jewish Prayer Book.
Modeh Ani	A morning Prayer.
